
Please welcome these players when you meet them online or at the tables.

WHAT AN INSPIRATION TO ALL OF US SENIORS

On my recent bridge cruise on Queen Elizabeth, I met a woman who looks like she is about seventy - very beautiful and elegant. She came to my bridge class, and she played in my duplicate bridge game. I was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to chat with her. I was truly amazed when she said a few years ago she had a very serious stroke, and she had to relearn her speech and walking. She proceeded to tell me that she is eighty-years-old, and because of her age and her complete recovery, the Canadian Medical institute is studying her progress by asking her to learn a new language.. Guess what? She chose bridge as her new language. Does this mean that research is trying to prove that learning a new language can improve one's memory at any age? And do researchers believe that seniors are able to learn and improve



their memory by learning a new language? Is that why they want to study her ability to learn after a severe stroke?

What an inspiration to all of us seniors, to be able to learn a new language at this late age, or for that matter, to be able to learn and retain what you learned is remarkable. She has proven that she has the ability to learn and retain new information.

Now you may wonder why duplicate bridge is considered a language. In duplicate bridge there are two parts: one is the bidding (which is the communication language of bridge) and the other is play of the hands. So duplicate bridge has a common communication language. This language is not a private language just between you and your partner. It is the common language at the table. Professionals and players like me use very sophisticated language to communicate and everyone at the table can ask what we mean, so it is not a secret language or anything like that. Good partnerships communicate very precisely.

Duplicate bridge is a very competitive game, with a unique language of its own. There are very large national and international bridge organizations all over the world where you can play bridge and communicate in the language of bridge. So, bridge also has a very large social component. I hear people complain that duplicate bridge is too serious and players are unfriendly, all of which is true while we are at the table playing duplicate, but when the game is over there is a lot of socialization and interaction and discussions about how certain hands should be bid and played.

I like to encourage anyone who is interested or curious about bridge or in improving their memory or to prevent further cognitive decline to give bridge a try. It has proven to be effective in improving your memory.

You can blame me when someone complains about your being addicted to duplicate bridge.

This is how the auction went at most tables and the opening lead was the 3 clubs.

When dummy comes down, and you count your winners, you can only get to 11 and the only place for a 12th trick is for a 3-3 split in either hearts or clubs which is a 34% chance. With the opening lead it looks like clubs are not going to split 3-3 and my partner Mike Bandler recognized that our club spots were so good that he won the J clubs with the Ace and he decided to set up the 12th trick by leading the club 6 toward the dummy and when West inserted the 10 he won that and forced out the Q setting up dummy's 9 for that 12th trick and getting a top board. This is an important card combination to remember.

Note here, when the bidding goes like it did, it is very important to make a safe lead that does not require you to find an honor in your partners hand. As it turned out, our table was the only one where a club was led.

Think about how you would have played this hand without a club lead and let me know.

Bridge Classes with Carol

At the Orinda Community Center: 925.254.2445 (26 Orinda Way)

RUSTY BRIDGE Part ITuesdays, November 5-December 1010am-noon

This course is specially designed for those who want to update their bidding skills, improve their communication with their partners, and/or revive their "college days" playing skills.

It begins with a **thorough** basic bidding review, followed by an introduction to the Stayman convention and leads against NT vs. Suit Contracts. Most likely Preemptive and Slam bidding, bidding in the "balancing seat", and knowing the distinction between forcing and non-forcing bids will be covered in **Rusty Bridge II.** Each session will consist of ½ hour lecture and 1 ½ hours of supervised play with pre-dealt hands that illustrate the subject of the day. A workbook is available from the instructor at a cost of \$15.

CONVENTIONS Tuesdays, <u>November 5-December 10</u> <u>1pm-3pm</u>

This course will cover my favorite 4 or 5 conventions including: Stayman and Jacoby Transfers, Negative doubles, Micheals Cue bid coupled with Unusual NT, DONT **or** New Minor Forcing coupled with 4th Suit Forcing. After each lecture on one convention, there will be at least 4 hands to play that demonstrate the subject of the day. No textbook is required.

THE DIAMOND SERIES/PLAY OF THE HAND Tuesdays, <u>January 14-</u> <u>March 18</u>

<u>10 am-noon</u>

Tuesdays, January 14-

The Diamond course is the ACBL intermediate 10-week course which focuses on "Play of the Hand". The main objective is to develop a "Plan by Declarer" including the counting of winners or losers, developing tricks, finessing, eliminating losers, managing the trump suit, considering entries, and avoiding the "dangerous" opponent. Each class will start with an overview lecture, followed by exercises and then play and analysis of four pre-dealt hands. Audrey Grants textbook <u>Play of the Hand</u> is available online.

★ BEGINNER BRIDGE/ THE CLUB SERIES <u>March 18</u> <u>1-3pm</u>

The Club Series is the official ACBL beginner's bridge course on the basics of bidding and play and is also useful for rusty players to update their game. It's an eight to ten-week course that includes hand evaluation, opening 1NT, opening bids, and respons-



es, rebids by opener and responder, overcalls, takeout doubles and responses, and basic play concepts. Each class includes "hands-on" practice in bidding and play. Audrey Grant's <u>Bidding in the 21 century</u> is available for purchase online.

P+ THE DIAMOND SUPERVISED PLAY Tuesdays, <u>March 25-May 27</u> <u>10 am-</u> <u>noon</u>

This is a series of 10-weeks designed to provide reinforcement of one's bridge skills learned in the Diamond course/Play of the Hand. Each week 8 pre-dealt hands are played while Carol is available for advice on bidding, declarer's plan, or defensive strategy. Time permitting, there will also be randomly dealt hands for further exploration and fun. All hands will be discussed.

RUSTY BRIDGE PART I

Tuesdays, March 25-May 27 1pm-3pm

This course is specially designed for those who want to update their bidding skills, improve their communication with their partners, and/or revive their "college days" playing skills. It begins with a **thorough** basic bidding review, followed by an introduction to the Stayman convention and leads against NT vs. Suit Contracts. Most likely Preemptive and Slam bidding, bidding in the "balancing seat", and knowing the distinction between Forcing and Non-forcing bids will be covered in **Rusty Bridge II.** Each session will consist of ½ hour lecture and 1 1/2 hours of supervised play with pre-dealt hands that illustrate the subject of the day. A workbook is available from the instructor at a cost of \$15.

At the Lafayette Community Center: 925.284.2232 (500 St. Mary's Road)

RUSTY BRIDGE Part II Thursdays, October 31-December 19 10am-noon

This course includes weak two bids, 2 club openings and responses, preemptive bids, defining what is and is not a forcing bid, and bidding in the balancing seat. Each session will consist of $\frac{1}{2}$ hour lecture and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours of supervised play with pre-dealt hands that illustrate the subject of the day. The same workbook used in **Rusty Bridge I** is available from the instructor at a cost of \$15.

P+ DIAMOND SUPERVISEDThursdays, October 31-December 191-3pm

This course is designed to provide reinforcement of one's bridge skills learned in the Diamond Course (Play of the Hand). Each week 8 pre-dealt hands are played while Carol is available for advice on bidding, declarer's plan, or defensive strategy. Each hand demonstrates a particular lesson. Time permitting, there will also be randomly dealt hands for further exploration and fun. All hands can be discussed if requested.

THE DIAMOND SERIES/PLAY OF THE HAND Tuesdays, <u>January 16-</u> <u>March 20</u> 10am-noon

The Diamond course is the ACBL intermediate course (8 - 10 weeks) which focuses on "Play of the Hand". The main objective is to develop a "Plan by Declarer" including the counting of winners or losers, developing tricks, finessing, eliminating losers, managing the trump suit, considering entries, and avoiding the "dangerous" opponent. Each class will start with an overview lecture, followed by exercises and then play and analysis of four pre-dealt hands. Audrey Grants textbook <u>Play of the Hand</u> is available online.

THE HEART COURSE/DEFENSE Part I Thursdays, <u>January 16- March</u> <u>20</u> 1-3pm

This defensive course **Part I** is an eight-week course that concentrates on defensive bidding and play. It encompasses Leads against NT, Leads against Suit contracts, Second-Hand play and Third-Hand play, and Signals. There will be an additional 8 pre-dealt hands every other week to bid and play demonstrating the lessons. The course book is available online.

Part II in April/May will cover Defensive Signals, How to Develop Defensive Tricks, how to interfere with Declarer's Plan, and Making a Defensive Plan.

P + THE DIAMOND SUPERVISED PLAY Thursdays, <u>April 10-May</u> <u>10am-noon</u>

This is an 8-week series designed to provide reinforcement of one's bridge skills learned in the Diamond course/Play of the Hand. Each week 8 pre-dealt hands are played while Carol is available for advice on bidding, declarer's plan, or defensive strategy. Time permitting, there will also be randomly dealt hands for further exploration and fun. All hands will be discussed.

THE HEART SERIES/DEFENSE Part II Thursdays, <u>April 10-May</u> <u>1pm-3pm</u>

Part II covers Defensive Signals, How to Develop Defensive Tricks, How to interfere with Declarer's Plan, and Making a Defensive Plan. Again, there will be an additional 8 pre-dealt hands every other week to bid and play demonstrating the lessons of the previous weeks lesson. The course book is available online.

We use the ACBL textbooks to teach bridge from beginning to intermediate and advanced. All Series are nine weeks long and meet once per week for two hours. The Cost is \$200 which includes the Textbook. Any student wishing to repeat a series can do so for \$100. Attending single sessions for a specific chapter is \$20 per session cost. It is possible to attend a class specifically for review of a specific chapter. If you would like the topic for a specific concept, please request information from Winnie.

Please sign up in advance for any classes with Winnie by phone or email or text (see contact information at the end).

On Mondays from 1pm - 3pm we are presenting Single Topic Seminars.

These seminar sessions often require some sort of special bid other than a real suit in

competition. It is to your benefit to understand the requirements and also what is given up. These sessions are \$20 per person. We use our large screen monitor (75 inch) to show examples. We work through the subject matter and then play sample hands hand that are specifically designed to support the lesson. With most of our seminars we actually have a library of subjects with professionally diagnosed descriptions. Most often 18 different hands with written explanations. We are able to send to any class attendee who wishes via an attachment.

time for when they are used against you during the bidding process.

accordingly. We will send out updates on the schedule in coming months to announce possible

changes.

That will require that either you or your agent contact Melissa as part of the booking process.

You will not be included in the group/game if you book the cruise elsewhere and then attempt to be included after the fact. Initial booking deposit must be through Melissa Mesker.
