"Gold for Good: A Bridge Event for Disaster Relief" gives players the chance to support hurricane -affected communities in southeastern United States and have the chance to win gold master-points from their usual morning and afternoon session pair games -- whether at a club, or a sectional or regional.

Help Where It's Needed Most

Working in conjunction, the ACBL and the ACBL Charity Foundation will support <u>World Central Kitchen</u> and <u>Direct Relief</u>. 100% of your \$30 registration fee – one each week you participate – will be donated to the cause. (The ACBL will cover any credit card fees.) Feel even more generous? You will be able to make additional donations. (This is coming soon.)

Go for Gold Points in All Morning and Afternoon Session Pair Games

Play in the morning and afternoon sessions during each of these weeks and be part of a larger event scored like a Side Series at a regional. The top player earns 20 gold points, and the top 25% of each pool (<u>further explained in the FAQ</u>) will also receive gold points.

There are two separate weeks of Gold for Good, each six days long. That's two chances to win! To qualify, you need to play in at least two sessions – (you can play in as many as six).

Any face-to-face pair game in a morning or afternoon session during the series dates counts, even special games. At least one game must be a face-to-face game. Only one face-to-face play per day will count. Games from Virtual Clubs and the ACBL Clubhouse will be averaged and considered as one result.

Instant Matchpoint Game

On Wednesday afternoon, October 30, clubs across the country participated in the ACB-Wide Instant Matchpoint Game. There were 112 clubs across 24 Districts with 825 tables and 3889 players all playing the same cards at the same time.

What is an instant matchpoint game?

- It's an ACBL-wide event exclusive for face-to-face clubs.
- Players see their scores instantly after each deal.
- Section tops in each direction earn one gold masterpoint (other points are red and black).

Players receive a booklet with analysis by expert players.

Anne Hollingsworth and **Irwin Lichtblau** from our Unit 499 took top place overall in this country-wide event with their 73.20% game. WOW!!!

Other big winners were Maddie Klein and Joyce Ellenberg who took 4th place in District 21.



So, what should you be hiding? It's your bridge hand. If you don't cover your cards, and you don't think folks will take a peek, you're not cookin' on all four burners.

I've really only seen one pair cheat, pretty blatantly, and they were dismissed from the bridge center. The directors reviewed a video of the game, and just with a minimal separation of their fingers, that indicated what card should be returned. Of course the title was taken away.

So, it's imperative to be cautious at the bridge table, and don't assume someone can't see your cards OR overhear the bidding and outcome of the game. Even when I groan, make a face, roll my eyes, or

take a deep breath, they're all give-always. Poker face is what we need, so you don't reveal what you're hiding.

This deal came up recently in a club game and I was very surprised that not one single declarer found the correct way to play it.

At my table the bidding went as shown and I still don't know what Norths 4N was asking and I am assuming South didn't either.

You can see that good things can happen when you interfere in their auction.

I think if 4N asked to bid 6 with a maximum, that South has that but was probably worried about not having any kind of heart stopper. If it asked for aces he should have shown two and if it asked for a suit, he had a very nice diamond suit.

In any case South passed this and I led the 9 of clubs and South won in his hand and played 3 more clubs followed by 4 spades and then cashed 3 diamonds starting with the K and finally cashed the A hearts losing the last trick to my partners J diamonds.

Do you see the correct way to play this? My friend Mike Lawrence says to study the deal and ask yourself what can go wrong. In 4N not much can go wrong since you have 12 top tricks. However, you have an opportunity to take 5 diamond tricks for a total of 14 tricks.

Yes, the diamond suit is crucial to making all the tricks and the clue that it might split 0-4 is in the bidding.

This card combination does not occur very often but when it does you must be prepared for it. It is most likely that East has the length in diamonds, he has shown up with 5 spades, some hearts, and a singleton club leaving room for 4 diamonds. So, simply lead a low diamond to the Q and then a diamond back to your hand, East must split his honors and then back to the dummy and lead another diamond picking up the entire suit. Note, you must lead the diamonds twice towards your A and K for this to work.

By the way, bidding 6N and making 6 gets you 75%. There were a bunch of them, making 7 would have been 100% while 4N making 6 was only worth 25%.

Another example of solving a problem and then giving you bragging rights.

The Weak-Two Bid

This bid is designed to do multiple things:

- 1. create a desire to play in the suit bid
- 2. take up bidding space the opposition could use
- 3. announce a limited number of high-card points start the dialogue between partners.

There are several responses that can be made after its use:

- 1. responder may introduce his/her own suit (normally non-forcing)
- 2. ask for more information (Ogust)
- 3. raise to further cramp opposition either one-level or 2-levels
- 4. Pass


The nature of the bid changes significantly the value of cards.

- 1. Queens and Jacks lose their offensive and defensive value as the weak-2 bidders' distribution makes them unlikely to take tricks
- 2. length in the 2-bidders' suit is a liability
 - 3. high cards in front of the 2-bidders' suit are vulnerable
 - 4. defense gets a head start

Use of this bid should guarantee to partner a desire for it to be led if the opponents get the contract. (consequently it should have 2 or 3 of the top 5 cards (especially when vulnerable).

It should contain a potential A or KQ for entry purposes.

MY FRIEND: BRIDGE

My first encounter with bridge was at sixteen. Shortly after seeing Dr. Zhivago twice and falling in love with Omar Sharif, I read a bridge column in the New York Times that quoted him saying, "It is easy to find a beautiful woman, but hard to find a good bridge partner." Fast-forward twenty-five years to 1990 when a friend was going to teach me tennis. However, after fifteen minutes on the court, he put the racket down and kindly said, "maybe it's better if I teach you bridge."

That was it! We took a few lessons and were told to go to any game but the Big <u>Friday night</u> game in Rockland County NY. It was a large competitive game run by Florence and Paul Silver (Joshua Donn's grandparents) where the best players in the area competed. Of course, my bridge partner said, "We are going to the <u>Friday night game!</u>" There were eighteen tables. We moved from table to table either giving gifts or fixes. You could hear some of the players snickering "Fix". One woman got enraged and said we did not belong in the game, but again my partner made us go. And we learned. I made close friendships and eventually met my love, Martin Weiss.

He was a far better player and would get angry with me. In an attempt to manage his temper, he wrote "Behave like a Mensch" at the top of his bridge card, but, alas, it did not work. As time passed, I became a better player but learned that I had to respond in an equal tone and that was the only thing that worked! This resulted in my Pasadena friend, unknowing the history, gifting me a "Bridge Witch" tee shirt.

In 2013 my husband had a minor stroke and could no longer drive. I was working at a small company with younger people who played loud music. It was difficult writing my economic analysis in that environment and one day I said, "Any chance we could change the music or use ear phones?" They said, "Beverly, do you want to work from home?" and that was it! My husband and I moved to California shortly after to be near family. We landed in Pasadena not knowing a soul. We played our first game in Arcadia and became part of a beautiful, warm, welcoming bridge community. My husband wrote the newsletter for a while, I became the persona non grata advocating for bridgemates/sorters but also volunteered for running the Christmas Dinner charity auction. I also began a New Year's Eve pot luck bridge party that celebrated New Year's Eve as it clocked in hourly across the world culminating with New York at 9pm PT.

My dear sweet husband passed away this past May. We met at the bridge table in the early 1990's and it took ten years before we had our first date, which never ended.

My farewell to the Pasadena Bridge community:

"On Friday I start the next chapter - driving to a new home in Northern California. I am sure Marty will be beside me – back-seat driving and holding onto the strap for dear life - as usual. It seems like I can never thank you all enough for making our stop in Pasadena so filled with Joy. "

It's a small world. Some six or seven years earlier, I met Art Mirin while advocating for a disease that both our daughters share. And now I find myself part of the bridge unit where he is president. Thank you to all the Livermore players who wore our advocacy tee shirts to the San Francisco Nationals in hopes of attracting the attention and donations of Bill Gates.

Thank you for welcoming me into your bridge community. I have been here for three months, and I appreciate the smiles at the bridge table. However, it is daunting to send an email to 350 (or 750) people looking for a partner, but who knows?

PS: My sister went to a NYC Bridge Club after her divorce having not played bridge since college. She assured them she knew the game and they found her a partner. He asked: Stayman? My sister responded, "Sondra Stein".

THE DIAMOND SERIES/PLAY OF THE HAND Tuesdays, January 14-March 18

10 am-noon

The Diamond course is the ACBL intermediate 10-week course which focuses on "Play of the Hand". The main objective is to develop a "Plan by Declarer" including the counting of winners or losers, developing tricks, finessing, eliminating losers, managing the trump suit, considering entries, and avoiding the "dangerous" opponent. Each class will start with an overview lecture, followed by exercises and then play and analysis of four pre-dealt hands. Audrey Grants textbook <u>Play of the Hand</u> is available online.

BEGINNER BRIDGE/ THE CLUB SERIES Tuesdays, January 14-March 18 1-3pm

The Club Series is the official ACBL beginner's bridge course on the basics of bidding and play and is also useful for rusty players to update their game. It's an eight to ten-week course that includes hand evaluation, opening 1NT, opening bids, and responses, rebids by opener and responder, overcalls, takeout doubles and responses, and basic play concepts. Each class includes "hands-on" practice in bidding and play. Audrey Grant's <u>Bidding in the 21 century</u> is available for purchase online.

+ THE DIAMOND SUPERVISED PLAY Tuesdays, March 25-May 27 10 am-noon

This is a series of 10-weeks designed to provide reinforcement of one's bridge skills learned in the Diamond course/Play of the Hand. Each week 8 pre-dealt hands are played while Carol is available for advice on bidding, declarer's plan, or defensive strategy. Time permitting, there will also be randomly dealt hands for further exploration and fun. All hands will be discussed.

RUSTY BRIDGE PART I

Tuesdays, March 25-May 27 1 pm-3 pm

This course is specially designed for those who want to update their bidding skills, improve their communication with their partners, and/or revive their "college days" playing skills. It begins with a **thorough** basic bidding review, followed by an introduction to the Stayman convention and leads against NT vs. Suit Contracts. Most likely Preemptive and Slam

bidding, bidding in the "balancing seat", and knowing the distinction between Forcing and Nonforcing bids will be covered in **Rusty Bridge II.** Each session will consist of ½ hour lecture and 1 1/2 hours of supervised play with pre-dealt hands that illustrate the subject of the day. A workbook is available from the instructor at a cost of \$15.

The main objective is to develop a "Plan by Declarer" including the counting of winners or losers, developing tricks, finessing, eliminating losers, managing the trump suit, considering entries, and avoiding the "dangerous" opponent. Each class will start with an overview lecture, followed by exercises and then play and analysis of four pre-dealt hands. Audrey Grants textbook <u>Play of the Hand</u> is available online.

THE HEART COURSE/DEFENSE Part I Thursdays, January 16- March 20 1-3pm

This defensive course **Part I** is an eight-week course that concentrates on defensive bidding and play. It encompasses Leads against NT, Leads against Suit contracts, Second-Hand play and Third-Hand play, and Signals. There will be an additional 8 pre-dealt hands every other week to bid and play demonstrating the lessons. The course book is available online.

Part II in April/May will cover Defensive Signals, How to Develop Defensive Tricks, how to interfere with Declarer's Plan, and Making a Defensive Plan.

+ THE DIAMOND SUPERVISED PLAY Thursdays, April 10-May 29 10 am-noon

This is an 8-week series designed to provide reinforcement of one's bridge skills learned in the Diamond course/Play of the Hand. Each week 8 pre-dealt hands are played while Carol is available for advice on bidding, declarer's plan, or defensive strategy. Time permitting, there will also be randomly dealt hands for further exploration and fun. All hands will be discussed.

THE HEART SERIES/DEFENSE Part II Thursdays, April 10-May 29 1 pm-3 pm

Part II covers Defensive Signals, How to Develop Defensive Tricks, How to interfere with Declarer's Plan, and Making a Defensive Plan. Again, there will be an additional 8 pre-dealt hands every other week to bid and play demonstrating the lessons of the previous weeks lesson. The course book is available online.
